### Course Goals and Description

GER 102 is the second of a four-course program (GER 101, GER 102, GER 201, GER 202) introducing the German language and culture. By the end of German 102 you will be able to understand and respond appropriately to simple questions and statements in German, read and react to a variety of German texts, and write about yourself and your likes, dislikes, and interests in German. We emphasize all modes of communication: interpersonal, presentational, and interpretive communication through speaking, listening, reading, and writing. Throughout this process, you will learn more about German-speaking countries and have fun with the language while improving your language-learning strategies.

We use a communicative-based approach to language learning at Purdue. This recognizes that we gain the ability to communicate in a language both through exposure to the language and active practice in the language. The course focuses on providing as much input (exposure) in German as possible through various means—from the teacher, classroom activities, audio, the internet, and video. Most of this input will be exclusively in German.

GER 102 will be conducted **primarily in German**. Don't be dismayed if you feel you cannot understand every word you hear or to produce perfect sentences. Keep listening for words you recognize that will function as cues for your understanding. Your acquisition of German will develop as you are exposed to more and more of the language and as you respond to what you see and hear.

Achieving the goals of the course requires regular practice with the language, both in class and individually, and a willingness to experiment with new structures, patterns of sounds, and phrases. In other words, you are responsible for much of your own learning: your **continuous participation** and **regular attendance** are vital parts of your commitment to learning and progress. The quality of your language learning will depend largely on the amount and quality of your effort. You are encouraged to visit your instructor's office hours with questions and concerns.

It is highly recommended that students obtain a bound Bilingual English>German dictionary, especially for use during in-class writing assessments. Student may also check out dictionaries from the HSSE library.

### iLrn Heinle Learning Center

GER 102 will use an online learning platform named *iLrn* that accompanies the textbook *Vorsprung*. The course bundle at the local bookstore contains a **printed access code** with the textbook that you will need to set up your iLrn account. **Please note that an e-book of *Vorsprung* 3<sup>rd</sup> is included with a subscription to iLrn.** Your instructor will provide a course access code and more information on iLrn in your first lab session.

### Attendance Policy

Class meets five times each week (M, T, W, TH, F) for 50 minutes in the classroom. Additionally, class meets twice a week for one hour (T, F) and the second class on Tuesday is for the computer lab. **Your attendance is expected and required at every scheduled session.** All absences will be treated as unexcused unless students request each absence to be excused in advance of, or as soon as possible after the absence in question.

**Excused Absences.** Absences may only be excused at the discretion of your instructor for legitimate personal, family, or medical emergencies. **Students must document their request to have an absence excused in an email to their instructor that includes the student's course and section, the date(s) of absences, and a concise explanation for the request.** Each request will be reviewed on a case by case basis. The instructor reserves the right to limit the number of excused absences granted to any student in a semester.

**Unexcused Absences.** In the event of an unexcused absence, students forfeit the ability to submit/make-up any work completed during their absence (including homework, quizzes, exams and projects). Students are, however, still responsible for finding out what information was covered in their absence. Instructors are not obligated to respond to students' emails regarding information/missed work for unexcused absences. **Any student exceeding 10 unexcused absences will automatically receive a failing grade (F) for the course.** Students are responsible for monitoring their absences throughout the semester.

### Active Participation

Students are expected to prepare all assigned work before each class in order to be able to actively participate. Your concentrated engagement in class activities and willingness to practice your skills by volunteering information in class are crucial in your development of your proficiency in German and to being successful in this course. It is not sufficient to simply be present in class. Your participation will be graded according to the criteria listed on pg. 7 of this syllabus.

Please respect your class and instructor by refraining from the use of electronic devices during class unless relevant to class work. Help to reduce distractions by disabling audible notifications on your mobile devices during class. Mobile devices may be used to access Blackboard materials or the iLrn e-book; however, the instructor reserves the right to ask any student to put their device away if used for non-class activities or if it creates a distraction.

## Homework

You should expect to spend **one to two hours** preparing for the next day's German class by completing assigned work, reviewing material, and practicing vocabulary. Keep in mind that homework is 15% of your overall course grade. **No late homework will be accepted.**

**Daily Homework.** Daily homework may include vocabulary review, review of grammar material, reading, or written or electronic assignments. Homework assignments for Monday – Tuesday will be collected in the lab session on Tuesday afternoon; homework assignments for Wednesday – Friday will be collected in the Friday afternoon lab session. All homework must be clearly labeled with the student's name and assignment information and must be stapled with other assignments due that day. (Staplers will be available in the lab.)

**Lab Work (iLrn: eSAM Activities).** You will be asked to submit online homework assignments each week from the electronic Student Activities Manual (eSAM) via iLrn. These assignments will appear in iLrn, and will be announced by your instructor. e-SAM activities will be due by Friday at 5pm each week. These will be graded according to the accuracy of your responses, but you will have the opportunity to do the exercises as many times as you would like to improve your score before submitting. The assignments are a combination of audio, reading, and writing assignments that will be mostly graded automatically by computer. Lab time will be partially engaged in regular class activities and partially in completing lab work.

## Quizzes

Students will write short in-class quizzes on vocabulary and/or grammar from assigned material during each chapter. Quizzes may be announced or unannounced. If you miss a quiz due to an unexcused absence, you will receive a zero for that quiz.

## Projects

During the course of the semester, you will complete 3 projects that will assess your progress in writing and speaking. Students will write two writing assessment projects that will engage key grammar and vocabulary from the textbook. Each assignment will coincide with the topic of the chapter that you are working on at that time. You will be allowed to use your textbook and/or a dictionary. In addition, there will be a speaking assessment where you will demonstrate knowledge of vocabulary and grammar extemporaneously.

## Exams

There will be two comprehensive exams for this course. The **Midterm Exam** will take place during your regularly scheduled course time over two days. Part 1 will cover vocabulary, grammar and content from the first three chapters, and part 2 will consist of listening and reading comprehension assessments.

The **Final Exam** will take place during on August 2<sup>nd</sup>. The Final will cover content from the entire semester, including material covered on the midterm. Students will be notified of the Final Exam schedule later in the semester.

### **Extra Credit**

Students may attend a German Movie Night film screening and completing a short writing assignment. Instructors will have more details on film schedules and extra credit activities. **Students must turn in their extra credit activity no later than one week from the viewing of the film in order to be eligible.** Students may only submit one extra credit activity (but are encouraged to attend all the films). For complete extra credit submissions, instructors will apply up to five points on students' lowest exam score.

### **Academic Integrity**

The School of Languages and Cultures requires the same high level of academic honesty and integrity that Purdue University expects of its students. Therefore, you will be expected to turn in your own work, without help from others or the use of online translation engines/services.

All work submitted for this class must be entirely your own work completed for this course during this semester. Students are not allowed to use any translation service or software for any course work (unless instructed otherwise), and may not receive any help from others on any work for credit in this course.
